A Mother's and Father's Day Surprise

Smith created her first classbook seven years ago just in time for a special event. "It was during spring, close to an annual event I hold for the students' families called 'Pastries for Parents and Guardians.' This event falls between Mother's Day and Father's Day. I have the students write letters to their parents and guardians. When I first discovered Studentreasures through an email I received, I thought it would be perfect for the letters my class writes. Parents often assume our book is for the poems we write during Poetry Month. Having just listened to their child's handwritten letter, they are thrilled when I pull the books out of the box at the end of our event. Seeing the letter published in a book alongside other letters from all the students in the class is extra special. I also write a letter to the parents, thanking them for all their support and cooperation throughout the school year."

Hesitant at First...

"Students are very hesitant at the beginning of the year with the writing process. By the time we reach our letter-writing in the spring, they aren't as intimidated anymore. When my class watches the Studentreasures Publishing tour video, they grasp the reality of it all, and their creative juices begin to flow. I access the free lesson plans and worksheets to help guide the writing process. Graphic organizers are an effective way to organize thoughts. I also show my classbooks from past years - the students love going through them, reading letters and seeing the illustrations of many of their schoolmates. Most want to create the cover illustration, so I usually make it a contest, and I have someone 'on the outside' judge for the winner."

Smith is delighted to share how her students blossomed as authors. "Creating a classbook not only helps highlight writing, which my students become more confident in, but also allows them to express their emotions toward their families through their precious letters. They have to stand up in front of everyone at our special breakfast on 'Pastries for Parents and Guardians Day' and read aloud their letters. They are proud to share their best writing along with their love and appreciation for the most important people in their lives. My students feel important, and they are truly satisfied with how their hard work turned out. It adds to the

excitement of our family event! It creates a memory they will cherish for the rest of their lives. The book becomes a treasure they will always have and can be shared for generations to come."

Sensory Imagery and Figurative Language

"Because they know their letters will truly be on display by reading them aloud at our family event and forever highlighted in a classbook, they approach this writing project with a very positive attitude. They usually focus on sensory imagery in their letters and enjoy coming up with examples of figurative language. It's a great project because it's not about having the neatest or longest letter. EVERYONE is included, and they can't wait to share their letters with the various people in their school lives: me, their classmates, administrators and their families. It makes for a perfect addition to our celebration as we head toward the end of the school year."

Emotional Moments

Smith reflects on the profound impact this project has had on everyone. "There have been two different school years where I have had two different students lose a parent. I can't express how emotional everyone felt when those letters were read aloud. This became cathartic for those students to write about their parents and illustrate it with their artistic abilities."

Smith gives tips on how to create a classbook and shares some tools available on the Studentreasures website. This isn't her first rodeo after all!
